# Perinatal Institute wins national Patient Safety



**Award** 

The Perinatal Institute picked up the prestigious Award for Clinical Leadership at the national **Patient Safety Awards 2013.** 

The award recognised Pl's groundbreaking work on **stillbirth prevention**, through improved antenatal identification of pregnancies at risk due to fetal growth problems.

The award was presented by Jenni Middleton, Editor of Nursing Times and Alastair McLellan, Editor of the Health Service Journal, at a ceremony addressed by Robert Francis QC and attended by over 1000 NHS staff at the Grosvenor Hotel in London.

Professor Jason Gardosi, director and Sally Giddings, head of Pl's midwifery team, thanked the judges on behalf of the many

clinicians around the region who had put in extra effort to improve local practice, and expressed the hope that the award will help raise awareness about one of the most ignored patient safety issues in the NHS today. 'We would like to dedicate this award to the many mothers whose sad pregnancy outcomes have taught us that in fact most of these losses are potentially avoidable'.






## **GROW** training associated with national drop in stillbirth rates


Recently released 2012 ONS data show that stillbirths have fallen to their lowest ever rate in England & Wales.

This drop can be attributed to significant downward trends in stillbirths in three regions where the majority of units have taken up GROW training & accreditation for the use of customised growth charts and protocols. In contrast, stillbirth rates remained unchanged in areas with low uptake of training.

Detailed audits in the West Midlands have shown a direct relationship between the training received and performance in antenatal detection of fetal growth restriction. The best units were performing 4 times better than the worst units.


Therefore the Perinatal Institute has commenced roll-out of GAP, a co-ordinated programme of growth assessment using the latest evidence based guidelines.

### Standardised maternity notes

## - a high quality source of information and empowerment

- antenatal screening timeline,
- antenatal admission forms, and
- full record of care for the perinatal period.
